### MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF **September 14, 2020**

CALL TO ORDER: Mr. Tersigni opened the meeting at 7:43 p.m., read the Open Public Meeting Notice, and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Minutes: The August 3, 2020 minutes were reviewed. All members present approved the minutes as presented with Mr. Smith abstaining. Motion carried.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

#### **PRESENTATIONS**

Five of the nine applicants provided presentations to the Committee and answered questions. Presentation slides have been included for reference.

Asbury Mill – Mr. Hunt provided the Asbury Mill presentation. Ms. Miller inquired why they moved the fire escape from east side of the building. Mr. Hunt explained that it was no longer code-compliant from a building code perspective and was visible from three sides, so the relocation of the fire escape would make it less visible from the road and more aesthetically pleasing for the historic district.

Mr. Urfer asked what the minimum amount grant funding is that they could accept since their request is for approximately 80% of the available funding. Mr. Hunt said accepting smaller funding amounts tend to be less economically efficient and can leave projects unfinished until more funding is received. If funds were reduced, they would prioritize the stair tower and elevator shaft; the plumbing, electrical, and some interior work would be eliminated for this round of funding.

Belvidere Community Center – Mr. Young provided the Belvidere Community Center presentation for the replacement of the oil boiler to a natural gas boiler and hot water heater.

Mr. Margulies provided the last three grant application presentations.

<u>Hope Community Center</u> – Ms. Miller asked if the windows are being replaced with the original type. Mr. Margulies said the application includes the windows being completely removed and the frames replaced.

Mount Bethel Community Center - Mr. Fiore inquired what the projected use of the building is. Mr. Margulies said it will be used a community center.

<u>Port Colden School House</u> – Mr. Fiore inquired if the plaster cracks coincide with the structural separation in the lathe. Mr. Margulies said the second floor has settled a bit and separated. When they repair the area between the front stair wall and museum area, they won't be taking out all of the deflection, so movement will be arrested to prevent the cracks from opening up again.

**Next Meeting**: The next meeting is scheduled for October 5, 2020 via WebEx, on which applicant presentations to the Committee will continue.

There being no further business, Ms. Miller motioned, seconded by Mr. Fineran to adjourn the meeting at 8:51 p.m.

#### 1833

John P. B. Maxwell constructs the house for his bride a year before Warren County's incorporation. It is then sold to the William P. Robeson family

#### 1937

Jennie Crane Jackson donates the property for the creation of The Free Public Library of Belvidere. For a period, the building also serves as the town hall.

#### December 2016

The Town of Belvidere closes its library after a referendum to join the Warren County Library system

#### December 2017

The building opens as the Community Center serving Belvidere and the surrounding communities with educational, cultural and recreational programming

#### 2018 - present

The Center offers a wide range of activities including education wellness, entertainment, games, social awareness, support groups as well as a sheltering space during bad weather. Attendance exceeds 2,000 in 2018, 5,000 in 2019 and exceeds 2,000 this year to date.

### Oil - to - Gas Conversion

#### Scope of Work

Remove existing oil-fired steam boiler that provides building hot water and heat through a network of steam radiators and replace with a natural gas-fired steam boiler and natural gas-fired hot water heater to more efficiently provide heat and hot water. The cost of this work is \$8,675.





- 1844 ME stone church built



- 1977 The Township of Hope acquires the building to maintain its public use








### History

- 1831 Morris Canal completed. A small village along the canal took the name Port Colden to honor the President of the Morris Canal Company, Cadwallader D. Colden. Incline Plane 6 West was on the edge of the village.
- 1830s Investment comes in anticipating growth to a large town.
- 1840 St. Matthew's Hall, now known as Port Colden Manor, built as a school. In 2019, it was listed as one of New Jersey's 10 Most Endangered Historic Sites
- 1874 Village contained a hotel, several stores and smithies, a schoolhouse, a boat yard, a distillery and thirty-five houses



- 1924 the Morris Canal is abandoned
- 1937 Port Colden described as a "ghost town"

### The Port Colden Schoolhouse


- Built in 1869 during the heyday of the village
- Influenced by the Italianate and Gothic Revival styles
- Exceptional example of the 19<sup>th</sup> century movement to build schools
- Used as the local community assembly hall


## **The Port Colden Schoolhouse**

- 20<sup>th</sup> century, School District acquires the schoolhouse and basin
- Basin infilled to accept the Port Colden Elementary School
- The "Old Schoolhouse" maintained for offices and a museum
